## OUR MISSION

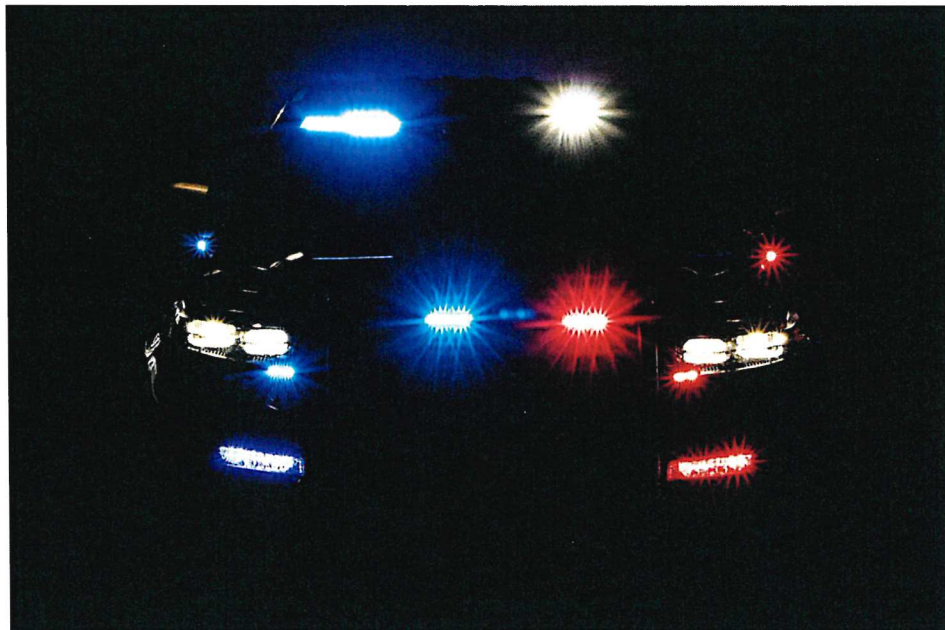
The mission for every member of this department is to consistently seek and find ways to affirmatively promote, preserve, and provide security, safety, and quality services to members of our community.

# STAFFING, TRAINING, AND FACILITIES

## STAFFING UPDATES

Officer Skyler Mullen was hired with the department in August 2022 and successfully completed the 720-hour police academy on December 16, 2022. Officer Mullen is an active military member of 11 years and has attended aircraft maintenance school for F-16 fighter jets as well as vehicle maintenance school with specialized firetruck training. Officer Mullen will complete 16 weeks of field training with the Belleville Police Department before beginning solo patrol.



## OFFICERS CONTINUE TRAINING

Collectively, Belleville Police Officers completed over 401 hours of training during 2022 which included topics such as State required firearm and EVOC training, school resource officer training, roadside interviews, autism and dementia training, and more. Part-time police officers add an additional 319 hours of training.

## DONATIONS

On November 16, 2022, Oregon Masonic Lodge #151 donated a fire suppression tool (FST) to be used by responding officers in the event of a house fire. These devices can reduce temperatures in a structure fire by 1,000 degrees in 35 seconds.



Other donations throughout the year consisted of gift baskets, cheese and fruit trays, cookies, and more.

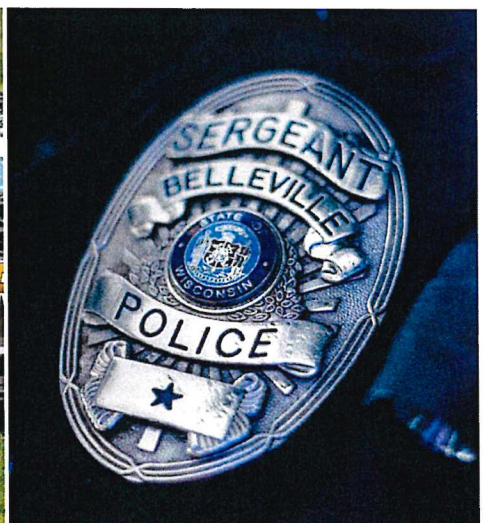
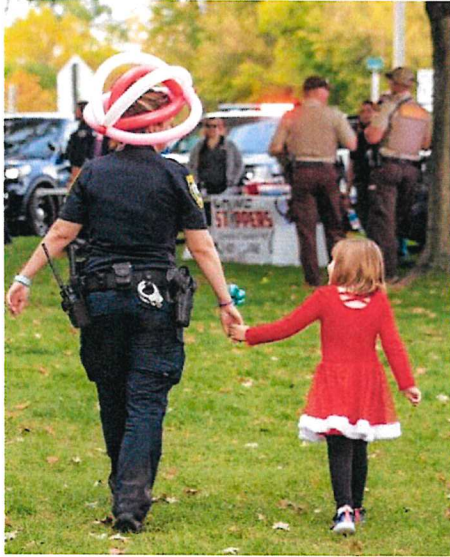
## COPS N BOBBERS

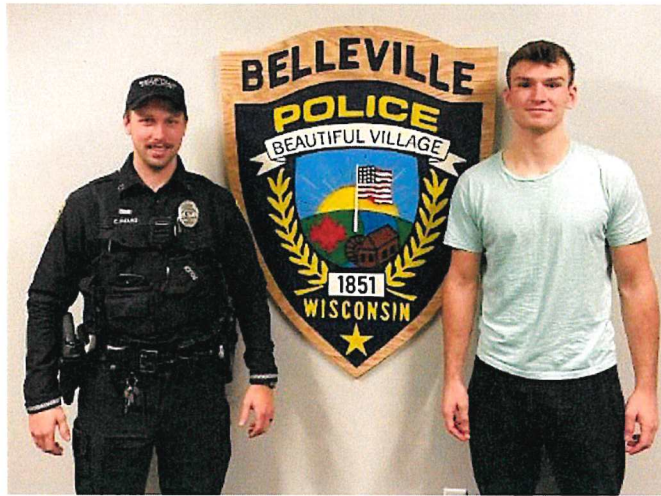


Students were able to tour the police department and learn about law enforcement, up close and personal!

## DRUG DISPOSAL BIN and NATIONAL DRUG TAKE BACK DAY

The Belleville Police Department, in collaboration with the Belleville Area Cares Coalition, hosted two drug take back days in April and October 2022 and including the BPD drug disposal bin located in the lobby collected 41.6 pounds of disposed medications. The collected drugs are delivered for proper disposal with the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA).

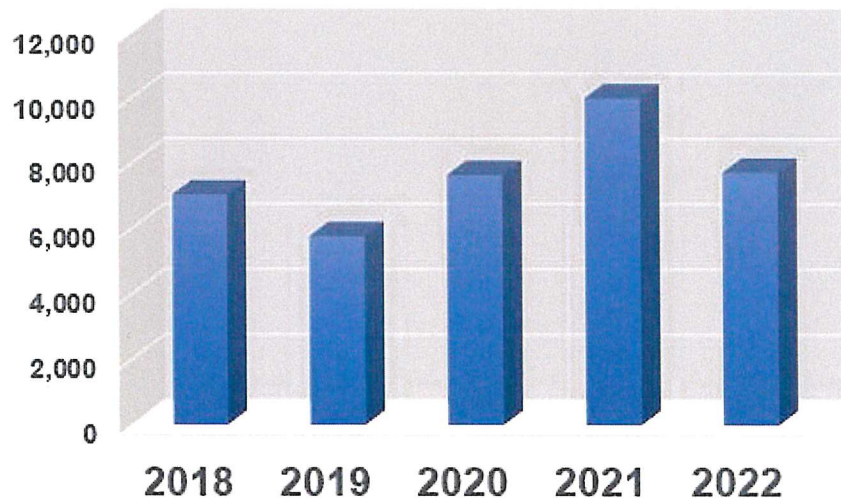
